What is Occupational Therapy?

Occupational therapy (OT) is the only profession that helps people across the lifespan to do the things they want and need to do through the therapeutic use of daily activities (occupations). OT practitioners enable people of all ages to live life to its fullest by helping them promote health, and prevent—or live better with—injury, illness, or disability.

Common OT interventions include helping people recovering from injury to regain skills, and providing support for older adults experiencing physical and cognitive changes. Services typically include:

- an individualized evaluation, during which the client/family and OT determine the person's goals,
- customized intervention to improve the person's ability to perform daily activities and reach the goals, and
- an outcomes evaluation to ensure that the goals are being met

OT practitioners have a holistic perspective, in which the focus is on adapting the environment and/or task to fit the person, and the person is an integral part of the therapy team.

Barbara Courtland Living Life One Day at a Time

A Hospice Story



Barbara smiles for all visitors!

The first thing you learn about Barbara Courtland when you enter her room is that she is a HUGE Redskins fan. Her room is filled with Redskins paraphernalia, including some handmade items from friends. She is surrounded by photos of her family, her pride and joy.

As a child, born and raised in NE Washington, D.C., Barbara and her family attended all the Redskins games. She can't remember a time when the team wasn't a big part of her life. She remained married to her high school sweetheart, Charles, for 52 years until he died after a long battle with cancer.

The couple was blessed with six wonderful children, Charlie, Georgie, Joyce, Sharon, Michael, and Bonnie. Barbara enjoyed being a stay-at-home mom while Charles served as a medic in the military. Later, after he got out of the Air Force, she worked at the Prince William Hospital Coffee Shop and in the hospital kitchen. Barbara's daughter, Joyce, fondly recalls, "She was always there when we came home from school. She always had a snack ready as she helped us with our homework."

After she had been a rehab patient at GHRC last fall, Barbara and her family were comfortable with having her come back to Gainesville for long-term care when the need became apparent. She says, "I like the food, the staff is very nice, and I really like my roommate!" She is content in her private cocoon, surrounded by her memories.

The family's decision to enlist additional support from hospice for their mom was, in part, a reflection of the wonderful care their dad received from hospice at home during his last few months of life. An aide came in several times each week to bathe him and a nurse came by daily to give him his medications. The chaplain visited several times each week, having long talks with Charles and Barbara. Volunteers would visit, providing support to all family members in need. Joyce comments, "They were all very caring, not just with my dad, but with my mom as well."

Joyce says, "Mom needs the extra attention that she receives from the hospice people. We have such peace of mind from the extra set of eyes on our mom. They are so patient and compassionate with her, explaining everything to her. The hospice nurse makes sure she is taking her medications. The nurse's aide bathes her. changes her, turns her, and generally checks her over each day. The chaplain brings a spiritual piece into the relationship, and the volunteers visit with her. I was coming here five times a week, driving over an hour each way, until I had a heart attack recently and had to slow down. It is good to know she is in such good hands!"

Judith Poinvil, RN, is Barbara's hospice nurse case manager. She assesses all of her medical needs, making referrals as required. She is there to help manage her patient's symptoms, such as shortness of breath, pain, or any other manageable discomfort. She maintains close contact with the doctors and collaborates with the center nurses and staff, hospice nursing assistants, hospice social worker, and the family.

With three years of experience, Capital Caring's Certified Nursing Assistant, Mpula Ayao, has been seeing Barbara on Tuesday and Thursday mornings for about two months now. They affectionately call each other "Doobie," a pet name. She says, "Barbara is such a positive person. She does not complain about anything!" During her visit she gives her a bed bath, helps her get dressed, gets her

adds, "I like to be with people, help them, talk to them, and get to know them. It teaches me how to live my life."

Capital Caring's Chaplain, Bob Dickey, MDIV, BCC, who is frequently seen walking around the building with his guitar, provides spiritual and emotional care to his hospice patients and their families. He explains, "I accompany people on a journey – on a boat – the patient directs the boat, I just support and guide them down the passage of the sea of life."

He practices empathetic listening, letting the patients tell their story – it's all about them! He seeks to find out what gives them purpose and joy, and what they live for. He adds, "As they look back over their lives, I affirm their achievements. Pictures help so much. Sometimes they have worries, although most people are believers, and wonder if they are going to go to Heaven."

Regarding Barbara he comments, "She is such a friendly and sociable person! She greets you with a smile and welcomes you to sit down and visit. She sure loves her family and her Redskins!"

Bob is often found playing his guitar and singing in one of the living rooms where the residents hang out and watch television. He feels very much at home in a nursing center because his first job after graduating from college was in a long-term care facility. He participated in an Administrator-in-Training program, and earned his Administrator license, prior to changing course and attending seminary. After pastoring for eight years, he switched to being a chaplain. He worked in hospital settings for 18 years prior to becoming a hospice chaplain, which he has been doing now for the past five years.

Another key partner in this collaboration is the Capital Caring social worker, Lorraine Krause, LCSW. She describes her role as the liaison between the family and the facility, helping the family members understand their roles and the facility roles. She says, "My focus is on the patient and also the family systems. I provide emotional support and provide validation of their feelings of guilt about placing their loved one into a facility. I offer a neutral

territory where they can talk and provide help in maintaining peace between the family members. I assist with planning ahead, filling out DNR forms, and making funeral plans." Lorraine sees Barbara twice a month. She says, "We don't talk about hospice during my weekly visits – we just focus on her quality of life! Barbara loves her children, her Cokes, and her snacks!"

Karen Barrett, one of the GHRC social workers, explains the initial process. "When a doctor makes a referral for a patient to go hospice, generally the patient has a poor prognosis. We give the family members all of the brochures from the various hospice agencies that we partner with so that they can make the best decision for their loved one. Then we set up a meeting between the family, their chosen hospice company, and the center staff to coordinate decisions about nursing care and medication changes. It is a positive experience for everyone!"

Barbara is kept busy with frequent visits from her children, their spouses, her 14 grandchildren, the GHRC staff, and the numerous Capital Caring hospice representatives. Everyone enjoys their time with her and looks forward to the next visit!

Joyce concludes, "Hospice is such a wonderful organization. We are so grateful for the loving care they give. We appreciate every member of the team, with their professionalism in both care and attitude toward their charges. We highly recommend this team for others in need."
